Overview

The Southern Appalachian Man and the Biosphere (SAMAB) Cooperative has a long record of success working to promote ecologically and economically sound land management practices in Southern Appalachia. SAMAB was the first regional biosphere reserve and serves as a model for similar organizations. Its emphasis on cooperation, science and education has visibly helped communities protect their natural resources at the local level.

Over the course of its history, SAMAB's two prevailing concerns have been the conservation of biological diversity and promotion of sustainable development. It has done this by sponsoring regional conferences focusing on critical environmental, social and economic aspects of life in the Appalachians, maintaining open communications with stakeholders, and by supporting regular meetings of the Cooperative membership. These efforts have led to a number of projects and partnerships among member agencies over the last 25 years. SAMAB has been in a unique position to make a difference in the evolving story of land management and conservation in the region. SAMAB's legacy of connecting the landscape, culture and people of the Southern Appalachia through trusted science and decision support information has given voice to the membership and respect across the communities served.

To encourage wise use of the area's natural resources and promote environmentally sound economic development; and to foster and support integrated environmental research, education and training, especially in relationship to national and global changes and their effects upon the region.

Vision

SAMAB will concentrate its efforts with the primary goal of promoting effective social action through understanding of sustainability as an integrated process of development involving all levels of social and governmental organization in an environment defined by natural, social, built and economic concerns.

 - Action Item: Create a web tool incorporating the WNC Vitality Index and expanding to cover the same extent of the Southern Appalachian Assessment Report, including key metrics from the USDA Forest Service Southern Forest Futures study.

 - c. Enhance communication about research and management needs and priorities in the Southern Appalachians to agencies and organizations engaged in developing research and management agendas.
 - Action Item: Integrate with Appalachian Landscape Conservation Cooperative

 - d. Increase communication outreach regarding key issues through web-site postings, blogs, news articles, twitter, and other social media outlets that convey information critical to the long term sustainability of the region.
